Recently at Greenfields...

We were lucky to find a gap in the rain to take Reception class out recently to watch our 'volcano' explode – it certainly has been one of the wettest starts to the year that I can remember! But I think you can see by their faces how much they enjoyed the experience. Reception have been learning about dinosaurs and reasons why they might have been made extinct, and volcanos and lava are certainly a theory. Well, reception class have loved every minute of their learning and can tell you all about magma, lava, tectonic plates and extinction – we certainly have a budding class of geologists and palaeontologists! This is always a wonderful topic to do with the children, and I am so impressed with their discussions, their knowledge, their attempts to write all the dinosaur names... Meanwhile, Y3 wowed us all yesterday with a wonderful class assembly all about their learning. Dress up as a character famous for their shoes – eg Dorothy from the Wizard of Oz, Puss in Boots, the Old Woman who lived in a shoe, etc

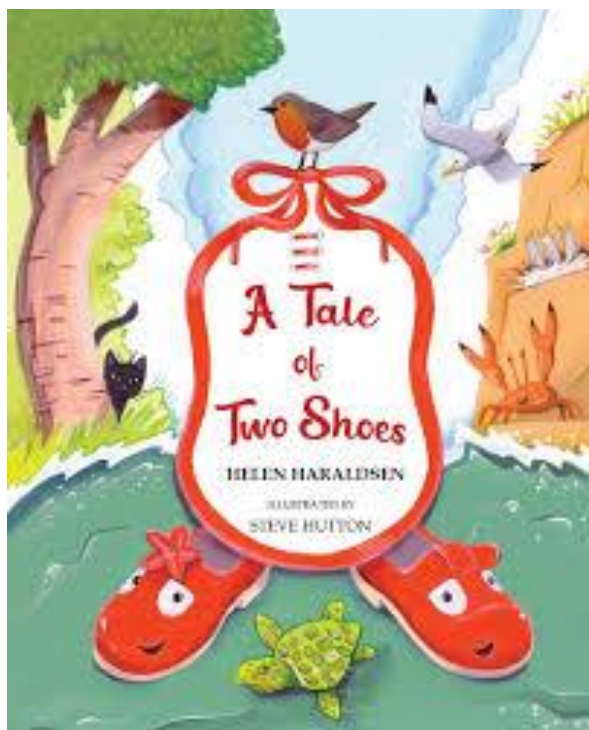
Or

We will then be spending the day with a shoe theme.

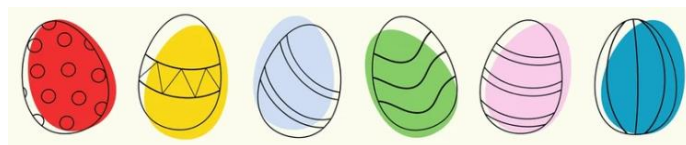

Easter 2026

The next half term is always packed and short! As always, we will be having our annual Easter Bonnet Parade on the last day, to which you are all invited – our parade will take place on the 27th March at gam in the hall. We ask that all children make a hat / bonnet at home and bring it to wear to the parade. Prizes are awarded for the best two hats in the class. We look for the input the children have made in the hats, so whilst we appreciate there are some very talented parents out there, it will be the children's work we reward.

As I have always done since becoming head here, I have got an Easter egg (and dietary alternatives) for every child in the school, however, in return, I do ask the children to do something for me. After half term I will be sending home the swap. Children will then be able to bring me their work during the last week of term and eggchange it for an egg of their choice. Site safety

Up until now, we have been quite open about sharing the car park with parents and allowing parents to drive in to collect and drop off children if late or early, but unfortunately the behaviour of a minority recently means we are now retracting that. Unfortunately, parents have not been adhering to the 5 mph speed limit, which has led to some near misses at the end of the day, and we have even had one parent walk in through the gates and activate the vehicle gate button to then be able to drive in at speed, when children and staff were in the car park. This is not okay. Parents will only be allowed to enter the car park if they have a valid blue badge to drop off or collect their child. We now expect parents; late, collecting, early- to park outside of school and walk up to the doors to collect or drop off their child.

We have also had parents walk onto site through the closing vehicle gates to then wander around the grounds during lesson time. Again, this is not okay. We have now put up clear opening times on the gates as to when they will be open. This is for the safety of the children as we are still out in lessons until the gates open and everyone comes on site. Please respect our rules.

Parental Survey responses

Thank you to the 40 families who responded to our parental survey. As we enter the very stressful time of an impending Ofsted, it is helpful to know where you think we are as a school and how we can continue to improve. The overwhelming responses are really positive and show that you have great faith in how the school is going, that your children are happy and safe, and you would recommend us to another person.

32 families responded to question about bullying stating it had not happened, with 3 saying it had, and 12 responses stated their child had SEND needs.

Within the comments were only two that need responding to, the others were all lovely for the staff to read. One was regarding the website which I agree needs updating, and I have already approached companies to do this for us this year. However, the costs are beyond what we can afford to give it a complete revamp currently. We do try to keep on top of the website, but as we are all teaching full time, some things do get put on in one place and not others. We have just tried to ensure everything is up to date, but if you see something that is not, please just email the office to let us know and we can do it as soon as possible.

The second comment was regarding homework. Every child is expected to read at least 4 times a week, every child from Y1 up should have brain trainer every night. There are spellings that need learning each week. Year 2 upwards also have times tables rockstars to do to embed their maths skills. Research (EEF) has shown there is no benefit to homework, and it actually causes us a lot more work chasing who has not done their homework than rewarding those who have. Every year we give you the opportunity to purchase the CGP books which are hugely beneficial, and on our website is the curriculum overviews so you can see what your child is learning should you want to support that more. There are also suggested websites for help. Every day children are being spoken to about not doing their homework, so for those who want more, there are plenty of ways you can support with additional work at home which does not add to the teacher's already heavy workload. Please speak to your class teacher if you would like some help in anything specific, but for now, we just ask that children do the homework we do set.

Thank you again to everyone who responded. As always, if there is ever anything you need, please speak to your child's class teacher or myself or Mrs Evans. We will always do all we can to help.

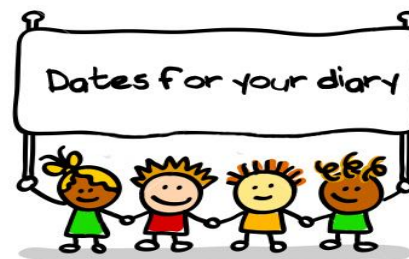
Attendance This Half Term

Today, Y4 class got a reward for being the class with the best attendance this half term. Normally the contest is between years R, 3,4 and 5 now, all hitting the government expected attendance each week, and you can see they only just pipped Reception to it. If they are not here they are missing out on so much, and not just learning.

Historically, the second half of the year always sees better attendance, but please remember that children can learn and be in school with a headache, that stomach aches normally disappear once their minds are off them, and that coughs on their own don't need days off. We will look after your children and if they are ill, we will send them home – but it is better to try to come in in the first place.
