

Y6 have lost their lino floor, but that can be replaced. What was really hard to work through has actually resulted in very little damage in the fabric of the building, and other than a few bits

of furniture to replace and some books, we have some through. So now after a swarm of bees, an infestation of caterpillars, a fire and a flood, I'm wondering what can be sent to try us next...

Meanwhile, school life has carried on. Year 6 led the whole school in an exceptional Remembrance Assembly and shared poems and thoughts about the day with a packed hall. So many friends and family joined us. It was incredibly moving. Year 2 had a fabulous day with their Great Fire of London workshop and impressed the facilitator with their knowledge – I think they even taught her something! Year 5 went to the South Oxhey Fun Run at Woodhall and did really well; Fun Runs are not fun for everyone, but everyone gave it their all and represented us brilliantly showing true determination and resilience. Nursery, Reception, Years 1 and 2 are beginning to practise their Christmas Nativity Story, whilst KS2 and beginning to belt out their Christmas songs, so there is definite positivity in the air. Added to this we had a visit from Electric Umbrella, who we will be working with next term to support our music curriculum. Electric Umbrella taught the whole school the beginnings of our Christmas song, 'Kindness isn't just for Christmas' which we cannot wait to share with you at our shows in December. Tickets will become available very soon, so make sure you get yours.

Attendance Autumn 1


